From the Principal Mr Doug Dearle

Hi all,

As this is the last newsletter for Semester 1, I am extremely grateful for the support and response that the school has received from all community members so far this year. The latter half of Term 2 has been about returning the school to “normality” and I believe we have been able to work together to help our students and staff stay together and work through a range of complexities. We still have a lot to do but we will continue to do this together.

KBCHS has recently completed testing as part of the Telethon Kids Institute DETECT study. This is to learn more about COVID-19 with regards to schools, students/staff and to better understand the role schools may play in managing this. During the remainder of this year the school will continue to participate in the

following:

- Project 2 – tracking transmissions as needed.
- Project 3 – health and wellbeing surveys to be completed during Terms 3 and 4.

To date we have over 500 responses from families to participate in the testing processes. Thank you for this support and we will continue to keep you informed of any developments as they become available.

School activities – the following activities can now be approved

- Interschool activities with a total not exceeding 100 people for indoor settings and not exceeding 300 people in outdoor settings.
- Contact sport and training is now permitted.
- Interschool sports
- Camps
- Work placements
- Incursions / Excursions
- P&C and School Board meetings
- Pre-arranged parent/carer meetings

The safety and wellbeing of all students and staff continues to be a top priority with cleaners being present throughout the school day to undertake continuous cleaning regimes and arrangements. Extra facilities remain in place, and we continue to support regular and thorough hand-washing for students and staff. Cleaning guidelines are based on, and continuously reviewed in line with, advice from the Department of Health.

Semester 1 reports – while student reports will be completed using the normal Department of Education templates, this Semester they will consist of the following information:

- judgements for students aligned to the Attitude, Behaviour, Effort (ABE’s) for each learning area.
- a comment based on work completed both in school and remote contexts.

Students will not receive a grade for Semester 1. As courses in MESH (Mathematics, English, Science and HASS) are year-long a grade will be awarded to each student at the end of Semester 2. This will reflect the achievement and progress that students have made throughout 2020. All reports will be emailed home on Tuesday 30 June 2020.

On behalf of the school I wish all students, staff, parents and carers a happy and relaxing holiday. We look forward to Semester 2 with students returning on Tuesday 21st July.

The relaxation of COVID restrictions has meant that many aspects of school life are slowly returning to normal. One component of this is Year 10 transition. Over the past few years Kalgoorlie-Boulder Community High School (KBCHS) has formed a great partnership with Eastern Goldfields College (EGC), and this year is no different. Last week, Miss Hart's Year 10 HASS class had a visit from Mrs Dowling, an ATAR History teacher, and Mrs Kingston, an ATAR Politics and Law teacher. The teachers delivered a lesson to the Year 10 students based on Year 11 content. The students were engaged and many of them expressed an interest in selecting HASS courses in secondary school. We are looking forward to welcoming more EGC staff to classrooms in the coming weeks.

Year 10 students this week attended a Course Roadshow delivered by EGC. This involved about fifteen EGC staff attending KBCHS and delivering engaging information sessions to the Year 10 students about different courses available in 2021. Rich discussions were had about pathway options, with many students grappling over whether to select a General, ATAR or Vocational pathway. Most students left the Roadshow with many questions answered and were one step closer to locking in their Senior Secondary pathway options.





Term 2 Science update

This term the Year 9s have been learning about the Chemical Sciences with a focus on the periodic table, chemical reactions, acids and bases. The students have been able to conduct a number of experiments to put the theory which they have learnt into practice. These have included making an indicator (chemical that changes colour) from red cabbage, making hydrogen gas to perform the classic hydrogen 'pop' test, and testing the effectiveness of different antacids.

The Year 8s have also been studying Chemical Sciences focussing on the states of matter, structure of the atom and the periodic table. There is a mnemonic (phrase) that quite a few students have been able to learn which helps to memorise the first 10 elements of the periodic table. The mnemonic is Harry Helped Little Betty Brown Carry Nine Oranges For Neil which helps you remember Hydrogen Helium Lithium Beryllium Boron Carbon Nitrogen Oxygen Fluorine Neon.

The Year 7s have been learning about Physical Sciences with a focus on forces and simple machines. Many students are now able to describe some forces that we experience in our lives and identify the various simple machines which make our lives easier.

STEM Microsoft Challenge

More from Science

Have you ever wondered what makes pancakes so fluffy? Why do pancake recipes always tell you not to overmix the batter? Where do the holes in pancakes come from? Year 9 students have been working very hard to find all the answers to these questions. They designed an investigation to learn about the chemical processes that make pancakes fluffy—and also why overmixing your pancake batter will result in tough, rubbery and flat pancakes, and what makes them light and fluffy. Here's what they discovered.



Pancake batter is composed of two crucial parts: dry ingredients (usually flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda and salt) and wet ingredients (usually milk, eggs and butter). Flour contains starch and protein. Flour contains a protein called glutenin (or gluten), which is crucial for the formation and structure of pancakes and baked goods. Gluten also provides the "chewy" texture in pancakes and breads.

When the flour is dry, the gluten molecules are nearly immobile, which means that they do not move much. They also do not bond (or "link") to one another. When the flour is moistened with water (or with milk and eggs, which are composed mainly of water), the gluten molecules become active. Wet gluten molecules are elastic and springlike (which means that they can change shape under pressure) and plastic (meaning they can maintain their shapes after being stretched and moved around). When flour is mixed with water, gluten proteins loosen from one another, stretch out and begin to rearrange. Further mixing allows the end of a gluten protein to bond with the end of another gluten protein. As the gluten proteins come in contact with one another, they continue to bond. With additional mixing, the proteins create a tighter and tighter, weblike network of proteins that are able to trap air bubbles. When chemical leaveners, such as baking powder, create bubbles in a cooked pancake, the gluten network traps these bubbles and allows a pancake to rise and stay fluffy yet still keep its shape.

A mixture of powdered tartaric acid (cream of tartar) and sodium hydrogen carbonate (baking soda) react when they are wet. This produces carbon dioxide gas, which forms bubbles and leaves holes in the pancakes. This also causes it to rise and produce a light fluffy batter.

You can see in these picture how the students revealed the secrets.

Year 7 students share their memoirs.

This term in Year 7, students have been studying the difference between fiction and non fiction texts, with an emphasis on biographies and autobiographies. Students read a range of short autobiographies in class then started writing a memoir of their own. As well as the memoirs, students also produced an autobiographical poster about their lives (so far); students understood that their teachers know that they are only 12 or 13. They brought in photos from home, and some even bravely stood at the front of the class and talked about their posters and their lives. Here are some of the things students learnt about each other.

- ◆ Some of them were born in places far away from Kalgoorlie, like New Zealand and Scotland.
- ◆ That they are influenced by a wide variety of music, including K– Pop.
- ◆ That they all graduated Year 6 and have cool photos to prove it.
- ◆ That lots of them have pets.
- ◆ They also learned that public speaking is a bit terrifying.

The History unit is coming to an end in the HASS Department

This term in HASS, our Year 8 students have immersed themselves in Medieval History, beginning with an investigation into the lifestyles and events of the Middle Ages, followed by an exploration of the Black Death. Activities have included designing and constructing Medieval castles, including making decisions about what kinds of defences could be bought for a limited amount of silver, recreating members of the Feudal hierarchy, and examining the (often disgusting) treatments for the plague.

We began by looking at the geography of Ancient Egypt, the importance of the Nile River as well as the social structure that existed. We then investigated religion in ancient Egypt and looked at the process of mummification. 




Fill out the online Secondary Scholarship application form on the MADALAH website.

MADALAH will liaise with your school/s of choice and the school/s will complete their order of preference following their own selection criteria. MADALAH will then allocate scholarships in line with contractual obligations and the school/s selection criteria. Should you not be successful with attaining a scholarship you should seek feedback from the school directly.

If you were to be successful in receiving a secondary scholarship the scholarship funds can only be utilised for the following and must also align with any school policies:

1. school fees & tuition;
2. boarding & accommodation;
3. uniforms;
4. textbooks & stationery;
5. IT equipment;
6. school leadership, cultural or sporting camps/tours;
7. tutoring, mentoring or counselling; or
8. personal expenses (e.g. health & hygiene).

The MADALAH Scholarship funds are paid directly to the school in two instalments, half at the start of Semester 1 and the other half at the start of Semester 2.

If your child is eligible for ABSTUDY, this is also paid directly to the school and will be utilised first.

SECONDARY STUDENT CRITERIA

1. Be of Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander descent and be able to provide proof of descent
2. Be eligible for ABSTUDY and provide proof OR be able to demonstrate some form of disadvantage, eg: financial, geographic, etc
3. Be seeking a secondary school scholarship
4. Apply to one of our partner schools and provide proof of offer or enrolment where you have it (this proof will be required before any scholarship can be considered)
5. Must provide most recent academic results
6. Must have a good school attendance and behaviour record
7. Must provide one letter from a referee
8. Scholars must have a home location in Western Australia

PROOF OF DESCENT

Proof of descent can be one of the following documents:

Letter from an Indigenous Corporation or Land Council

Parent's or Grandparent's proof of descent + child's birth certificate (if submitting proof of descent for a grandparent we will also require the parent's birth certificate)

PROOF OF ABSTUDY ENTITLEMENTS OR PROOF OF DISADVANTAGE

Please note that to be eligible for a MADALAH Scholarship you will need to be eligible for ABSTUDY or provide proof of disadvantage. If you are not already in receipt of ABSTUDY please apply as soon as possible as this process can take several weeks.

If you are not eligible for ABSTUDY but consider yourself to be disadvantaged you will be asked to determine whether this is due to financial, geographic or other.


You will also be asked to supply supporting documents, for example, a recent tax return if you consider yourself to be disadvantaged due to financial strain or proof of address if you consider yourself to be disadvantaged due to location.

If applying because you consider yourself disadvantaged in any other way please provide further detail at time of applying.
